Budget and Board Candidate Vote by Library Director Tim Wiles

On Tuesday, May 18, Guilderland Central School District voters will have their annual opportunity to vote on the library budget and to choose members of the Library Board.

This year, our 11-member board has four openings, and six candidates running. Listed alphabetically, the candidates are: **Michael Hawrylchak, Herb Hennings, Norina Melita, Philip Metzger, Jr., Antonio Rivera, and Vanessa Threatte** (see candidate information on page 2). These names will be listed in a random order on the ballot, per standard practice. I thank all six of these folks in advance for their willingness to volunteer their time to guide the library forward, and I thank the two incumbents (Hennings and Metzger, Jr.) for their current and past service.

The library has carefully prepared a conservative budget for 2021-22, with a 1.48% increase in the tax levy and a total budget amount of \$4,097,100, an increase of \$16,922 over last year's budget. The annual budget is different from the construction budget, though the construction project has some effect on the operating budget. For example, there is little in the annual budget regarding new furniture, equipment, or related costs, as most of those areas are being upgraded and updated as part of the construction project. Operating costs are slightly higher, as there will be about 20% more square footage to clean and supply with materials. The budgeted cost increase to supply the additional space is \$49,200. which is mostly offset by utility and other savings. The library is sticking to our pledge to voters not to create any new positions as a result of the renovation and expansion.

Our library materials budget stays the same, and our personnel costs increase by about two percent due to contractual agreements with employees negotiated by the board. Our utilities budget stays the same. Voters might wonder why it need not increase with a larger building, but the updated HVAC, lighting, and water systems all use less energy or water, resulting in a savings per square foot that equals out. We're trimming our programming (events) budget as we anticipate a gradual return to comfort level among the general public attending indoor events due to the pandemic, which of course we hope is winding down.

On the revenue side, our fines and fees for lost items revenue will be down as we continue to waive such fees in many cases due to the pandemic. We also anticipate less interest income, as the supply of money available for borrowing nationwide is so high that CDs, our usual method of earning interest on our operating budget, are essentially unavailable. We've switched instead to treasury bonds, which yield less income, but are the best available option at this time for short term investment. We are lowering the price of photocopies by 50%, one way of reducing library costs for our citizens. Black and white copies will now be 10 cents, and color will be 25 cents, which brings us in line with all other local libraries. We anticipate that patrons will make more photocopies as a result. 
